ASK PASTOR MARY JO...

"How old do you have to be to share the Sacrament of Holy Communion?"

This question has recently been raised. There has been a tradition in some of our churches, stemming from the Evangelical and Reformed and Congregational heritage of the United Church of Christ, that only Confirmed persons were to be allowed to take Communion.

Some of our churches acknowledge the practice that, at their parents' discretion, children may be allowed to receive Communion when they are ready. Some of our churches practice "first Communion," where children of the same age are instructed in Sunday School

and then, receive the Sacrament together for the first time. Other congregations of the United Church of Christ simply uphold the tradition that all are welcome at the Communion Table.

There is, in the National United Church of Christ not ONE specific ruling concerning the Sacrament of Holy Communion. The Sacrament, in itself, was instituted by Jesus on that night before he died, and, according to the scriptures: "The Lord Jesus on the night when he was betrayed took a loaf of bread, and when he had given thanks, he broke it and said, 'This is my body that is for you. Do this in remembrance of me.' In the same way he took the cup also, after supper, saying, 'This cup is the new covenant in my blood. Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me.' 1Corinthians 11:23-25

Our Church Council discussed this topic at our March meeting and agreed that if, we say "no matter who you are and where you are on your life's journey, you are welcome here" and if we say "all are welcome at the Communion Table," then, everyone, of any age or religious affiliation, is invited to share the Sacrament of Holy Communion here at Community United Church of Christ, Medford, WI.



Church Council Meeting minutes March 13, 2018

OPENING President Randi H. called the meeting to order at 5:06 p.m. Pastor Mary Jo led a prayer of guidance.

PRESENT Randi H., Mike G-P, Jerry G-P, Dawn B., Pam O., Anna G., Pastor Mary Jo

SECRETARY'S REPORT The minutes from the February 2018 meeting were emailed prior to tonight's meeting for preview. Correction to February 6 Minutes regarding parsonage furnace repair: "Joyce P made a motion to pay for furnace repair from Building and Grounds Fund." Anna G. made a motion to accept the meeting minutes with the correction. Dawn B. seconded the motion.

TREASURER'S REPORT Mike G-P distributed copies of the February Income and Expenses Reports to Council members for review. Dawn B. expressed concern about the cost of the color printing and the Council members discussed possible ways to cut down on color copies. Jerry G-P. made a motion to accept the report. Anna G. seconded the motion. Motion carried.

PASTOR'S REPORT Pastor Mary Jo distributed her February Pastor's Report and led us through some of the high points of her monthly activities, including Holy Week events, NWA Association Annual Meeting, Marilyn Scholl's funeral

GROUP AND COMMITTEE REPORTS

Audit Committee Jerry G-P and Gloria C. audited November, December, January, February General Fund checkbook registers for General Fund and SCRIP accounts. No discrepancies were found.

Building and Grounds Jerry G-P reports that Mark J. has been patching furnace room walls and the now looks dry.

Candlelight Guild Dawn B. announced that the Candlelight Guild Soup Supper will take place on April 7, 2018 with proceeds going to the Church Roof Fund.

Communications Team Anna G. brought up the fact that the church's website calendar is in error and reads "busy" for each event on the calendar. Pam O. suggested that the website calendar be fed from the Church Google calendar to resolve this issue. Mike G-P will populate a Church Google calendar and Pam will link to that calendar rather than her personal Google calendar to see if that resolves this issue.

Christian Ed Christian Ed will host Pancake Breakfast on Palm Sunday after the service, and Maizy and Sabrina Johnson will also be baptized on Palm Sunday.

OLD BUSINESS

Raise in Organist Salary Pam O. made a motion to raise organist pay from \$40 to \$50 per service, retroactive from January 1, 2018. Dawn B. seconded the motion. Motion carried.

Church Fund-raising Idea The Council further discussed a "Buy a Sheet" Church Roof Fundraiser concept that was initially introduced by Dawn B. at the February Council Meeting. The concept: Members would be invited to purchase a sheet of metal roofing in memory or honor of people or special dates. It was estimated that approximately 200 sheets are required to complete the project and if each sheet could be dedicated at a cost of \$80, we could raise much if not all of the remaining \$16,000+ of the cost. Randi H. to work with B&G to determine total number of metal sheets to complete the project and get that number to Pam O. before the next meeting. Pam O. to write a draft letter to members regarding the fundraiser and present it Council and B&G committee on April 12 for consideration.

NEW BUSINESS

Blessing Box Hollyann G. and Sandy F., 7th Grade Girl Scouts, presented their concept to build, install and maintain a Blessing Box that would be placed at a convenient location outside the church.

The Blessing Box theme would be: "Take what you need. Bring what you can. All are blessed." Contributions to the Box include non-perishable foods, diapers, hygiene products

The girls presented the rationale for the Blessing Box, different design concepts and different logo concepts. The Council Members had the opportunity to ask the girls questions and express any concerns about the concept. Pastor Mary Jo suggested that the girls call Ebenezer UCC in Green Bay to get more information about their Blessing Box. Hollyann and Sandy will present more detailed plans and drawings to Council and B&G Committee at a later date to be determined. Jerry M make a motion to look further at the proposal of a Blessing Box. Anna G. seconded the motion. Motion carried.

Church Promotion Ideas Members discussed ideas about how to create visibility in the community for our church as a UCC church, since many people still refer to us as the Red Brick Church and do not understand our UCC denomination. Ideas included: 1) Updating the motel cards and posters with our new logo and re-attempt distribution. Pam O. to update cards and reattempt distribution. 2) Medford Café placemat advertising, bulletin board poster. No member assignment made. 3) Newspaper display ad with photo of church, our All Are Welcome message, and our website URL. Pam O. to check out costs for display advertising.

Confirmation and Holy Communion Issue Jerry G-P brought a member's concern to the Council regarding our current practice of allowing non-confirmed children participate in the Sacrament. The issue was discussed. Pastor Mary Jo will clarify the current practice with church members during upcoming services.

APRIL MEETING DATE The next meeting will be held at 5:00 pm on Thursday, April 12.

OTHER BUSINESS

New Deposit Slips Mike G-P created a new deposit slip that will clarify the amount of gifts dedicated to different funds.

Pew Resurfacing Building and Grounds to contact JD Harris regarding an estimate/suggestions for resurfacing the veneer on the pews.

CLOSED SESSION

After reciting the Lord's Prayer with all in attendance, the Council members went into Closed Session at 7:20 p.m.

ADJOURNMENT Pam O. made a motion to adjourn the meeting. Dawn B. seconded the motion. Motion carried. Meeting adjourned at 7:21 p.m.

It is with great joy we announce that Dr. Heather Ann Moody will be our keynote speaker. Dr. Moody is an enrolled member of the Ho-Chunk Nation of Wisconsin and an assistant professor of American Indian Studies at UW-Eau Claire where she teaches a variety of subjects within the discipline. She has a doctorate in education with an emphasis on teaching and learning. Dr. Moody has presented at national and regional levels on the topic of Native American curriculum. She has lead Domestic Intercultural Immersion experiences to Pine Ridge Reservation and this spring to northern Wisconsin Ojibwa communities. Dr. Moody also serves as a co-advisor for the Inter-Tribal Student Council organization at UW-Eau Claire. Her topic will be Getting to Know Our Neighbors, Past and Present. The Black River Falls, Hock UCC, has been invited to share their ministry and experiences as well. You won't want to miss these presentations!

Open and Affirming (ONA)

In the coming months, you will be hearing more about Open and Affirming. Below is a brief summary of what Open and Affirming is and answers to some questions you may have.

Open and affirming. Open and Affirming (ONA) is an official designation of congregations and other settings in the Community United Church of Christ (UCC) affirming the full inclusion of gays, lesbians, bisexuals and transgender persons (LGBT) in the church's life and ministry.



What is the definition of "Open and Affirming" (ONA)? Is it just one issue? An "Open and Affirming" setting of the CUCC (a local church, campus ministry, etc.) means that it has publicly declared that gay, lesbian, & bisexual (GLB) people (or those of all sexual orientations) are welcome in its full life and ministry (e.g. membership, leadership, employment, etc.). It bespeaks a spirit of hospitality and a willingness to live out that welcome in meaningful ways.

- Q. What can I expect in an ONA church?
- A. A community of faith where you and your family are safe!

Because each congregation in the Community United Church of Christ is independent, and therefore free to make its own decisions, there is a broad diversity of theology and practice in our tradition. In the UCC, there is no hierarchy that can impose uniformity on our churches. Each ONA congregation has independently adopted an Open and Affirming covenant after a journey of dialogue, study and prayer. There are differences between congregations, but generally, an ONA church:

- 1. is a safe space for open and honest conversation about human sexuality and gender identity.
- 2. encourages LGBT members to serve in lay and ordained leadership.
- 3. celebrates same-sex weddings.
- 4. celebrates the anniversaries of LGBT married and partnered couples.
- 5. advocates for marriage equality and LGBT civil rights.
- 6. is willing to host meetings of support groups like PFLAG (Parents and Friends of Lesbians and Gays).
- 7. advertises that it is a safe space for LGBT and questioning youth.
- **8.** participates as a group in the local LGBT Pride Parade.
- **9.** celebrates ONA Sunday once a year and annually renews its ONA covenant.
