Important information from the Wisconsin Council of Churches: With One Body And One Spirit: Returning To Church 3.0

If one member suffers, all suffer together with it; if one member is honored, all rejoice together with it. Now you are the body of Christ and individually members of it. (1 Corinthians 12:26-27 NRSV)

INTRODUCTION With One Body and One Spirit is the third major update to the Wisconsin Council of Churches' ongoing guidance to churches on making safer choices during the COVID-19 pandemic. This document builds on the recommendations contained in By Faith We Stand Firm: Ministry in the Era of COVID Variants, Returning to Church 2.0, Bearing with One Another in Love and Love Builds Up.

With One Body and Spirit: Situates Christian life in the context of the pandemic and articulates a holistic, community-based vision of health in response to COVID.Sugge sts mitigations for unsafe, safer and safest conditions that can reduce (but never eliminate) risk, particularly if they are layered together in use.

Introduces the concept of risk budgeting, a method of allocating acceptable risk and making trade-offs to "spend" risk intelligently. Provides reflections on best practices, such as universal masking standards, vaccination requirements, livestream vs. hybrid worship, and responding to COVID exposure in the congregation.

CURRENT RECOMMENDATIONS (IN BRIEF)

1. Discern carefully the level of acceptable risk, both for your community and its individual members. Consider particularly the needs of those who may have lower risk tolerance, certain medical conditions, or who care for vulnerable people. Once you have decided how much risk you are willing to take on, spend your risk budget wisely, looking for ways to offset high-risk activities.

2. Practice layered mitigations. The forms of risk reduction suggested in With One Body and Spirit are not intended to be an all-or-nothing package. The more mitigations you are able to add, the more risk of COVID transmission can be eliminated, but adding even a few of them will make your church a safer environment. View the full document for additional details.

3. Know when to say no. A "Very High" COVID transmission level in the state or county (1450 cases per day statewide or 25 cases per 100,000 people per day in a county) should be a warning signal that changes in behavior and practices are necessary. We strongly urge that at a level of 50 new cases per 100,000 people per day, if you have not already done so, your faith community move to its strictest COVID protocols. <u>WCC maps relevant county-level metrics</u> (vaccinations, new cases, and positive test results) on its website, and provides state-level data on Facebook, updating each week.

Grace and peace, dear friends.

One of my greatest passions is climbing Colorado's "fourteeners" – the 58 mountain peaks exceeding 14,000 feet. In my office are 14 little stones, with the names and altitudes of peaks I have summited thus far. Most of the climbs are physically and mentally grueling. One particular challenge of mountain hiking is that often when you think the peak is in sight, it is actually still a few peaks away.

This is what COVID feels like to me right now – a mentally and physically grueling experience with too many peaks. The combination of the fast-spreading Delta variant and vaccine resistance has thrust us into a fall season we did not expect. Frustrations are high and patience is waning.

"How long, O Lord" pleads the Psalmist. "How long must I bear pain in my soul and have sorrow in my heart all the day? How long shall this enemy be exalted over me?" (Psalm 13:2)

I imagine the Israelites felt this agony as they wandered in the desert for years. Seven centuries later, they endured the anguish of captivity in Babylon. The great prophets experienced exasperation not unlike we feel today, trying to convince stubborn people to prioritize the common good and take special care of the poor and vulnerable. And surely the early Christians were fatigued and afraid as they dealt with the challenges of church planting.

Sometimes, ministry feels like ascending a mountain: The only way to continue is to count 25 steps in the thin mountain air, then stop for a breath. The journey through COVID is the same way, so don't forget to pause for a deep breath. We will make it. Yes, we have faced conflict, stress and loss. We have stretched ourselves to adapt, and we have had to remind ourselves that we are stronger together.

The Church will survive, and thrive, partly because of our faithful efforts, but mostly because the Holy Spirit is a powerful and persistent agent of God's transformational goodness. We are partners in this Jesus-led labor of love and, despite our collective lament, we have things to celebrate. New modalities for worship and meetings. New perspectives on work/life balance. New faces in the spiritual seekers, from whom the United Church of Christ has been the best-kept secret, who are now discovering a heartfelt message of grace and a commitment to justice.

Some of you have asked about the latest guidelines for COVID protocols at church. Although a small proportion of our congregations remain virtual only, most are meeting carefully in person and online. We continue to encourage outdoor worship as long as the weather allows, socially-distanced seating indoors with masks, individual Communion sets, stationary offering plates and distanced passing of the peace. Every congregation is different, so we encourage careful and prayerful discernment around your community's life.

We remain grateful for the guiding work of the Wisconsin Council of Churches (provided to you by your OCWM gifts). Here is a part of a recent WCC communication with some useful links:

Churches across the state are reassessing their fall ministry plans. With the <u>rapidly spreading Delta</u> <u>variant</u>, many congregations are choosing to re-instate universal masking, go back outdoors, or go back online. Our latest Returning to Church supplement, <u>By Faith We Stand Firm: Ministry in the Era of COVID</u> <u>Variants</u>, offers advice and theological grounding for congregations as they have these important conversations.

Two final thoughts . . . First, it strikes me that even as we worry about rebuilding congregational life, most of our communities have been spared from devastating natural disasters. Fires continue to rage in the West and storms have surged from the South all the way through the Northeast. Thousands of Afghans find themselves in need of a home and a community. As always, the United Church of Christ invites your contributions to our <u>disaster relief</u> and <u>refugee resettlement efforts</u>.

Finally, as most of you know, our dear staff colleague the Rev. Lorraine Ceniceros has been called to be the next Conference Minister for the Kansas-Oklahoma Conference! We will send her forth with cheers and prayers in mid-November. We already have launched a search for a new Associate Conference Minister in our southern region. Details can be found here. Within a week or so we will have a Search Team in place to begin the process of prayerful discernment.

CONSENT AGENDA

SECRETARY'S REPORT The August minutes were emailed prior to the meeting for preview per the Consent Agenda method. Jackie H. made a motion to approve the minutes with changes. Gloria C. seconded the motion. Motion carried.

TREASURER'S REPORT The August Treasurer's Reports were emailed prior to the meeting for preview per the Consent Agenda method. Jerry G.-P. made motion to accept the report. Pam O. seconded the motion. Motion passed.

The Pride Tribe is planning a meeting in the Prayer Park on Friday, September 24.

The next meeting is TBD.

CHRISTIAN ED

- Pastor MJ reported that she sent a letter to parents of children who are approaching confirmation age to check interest in beginning a two-year, 22-session confirmation study scheduled after school every other week.
- Pastor MJ reported that for the past year there has no formal Christian Ed Committee. Scott K. will check with former members to see if they are still interested in serving on the Committee.
- Pastor MJ will check with parents of children currently attending Faith Formation to check on their interest in serving on the committee.

CANDLELIGHT GUILD

Gloria C. reported that the Guild is still discussing the feasibility of a Holiday Fair and Fall Soup Supper and would like the Council's input.

The next meeting will be held on Tuesday, September 14 at 5 pm.

PARSONAGE COMMITTEE

No meeting scheduled.

SEARCH COMMITTEE

- Meeting scheduled for September 23 at 6 pm with Rev. Franz Riegert in attendance to offer guidance in the search process.
- Mike G.-P. reported that we have one application's profile for consideration. Applicants will receive letters of acknowledgement of their application from the committee.
- Mike G.-P. reported that Rev. Riegert suggested that we review applicants every few months for possible interviews.

Jerry G.-P is seeking an additional person to sit on the Search Committee.

Scott K. suggested that we outline the search process to share with the congregation in next month's newsletter.

NEW BUSINESS

- Ushers schedule for September: Pam 9/12, Jackie 9/19, Jerry G.-P 9/26, Gloria C. offered to be an alternate in case a person cannot make it for date scheduled.
- No changes to COVID protocol, although we will recommend wearing masks to protect those who are not vaccinated, those who are immune compromised, and those children who are not eligible for vaccination. We will also still comply to social distancing and hand sanitizing.

Mike G.-P is preparing the documents Council members will require for our budget planning next month.

- The Kiwanis will pick up the Coats not taken during the Free for All events for their annual Coat Collection. The Council has decided, in light of the COVID surge, the church will not be a drop-off or pick-up location for the Coat Collection this year.
- The Council discussed the Safe Church Policy's requirement for new employee background checks. Current employees are "grandfathered in" but new employees will need to have background checks. According to our policy, it doesn't say how often checks need to be performed. Mike G.-P. will check with our insurance provided to check on what we may need to require to comply with our liability insurance.

Scott K. reported that we are continuing to sanitize church on Mondays and Fridays each week.

If it feels like you don't know where you're going, that's okay. Here's something that can help you reflect on what God might have in store for you and your congregation.

Can We Talk?

Let all of us speak the truth to our neighbor, for we are members of one another. Be angry, but do not sin; do not let the sun go down on your anger. Ephesians 4:25-26

In this, like many of Paul's letters, he advises the new Christian community on how they should communicate with one another during times of difficulty and stress.

What might Paul advise the church today?

Last spring, with the availability of effective vaccines, we thought the COVID crisis was finally behind us and we could return to the "before times." We were back in the sanctuary for

worship and reuniting with our community of faith. But then COVID infection rates began rising and we are once again having to make difficult decisions that cause the community stress.

We want to sing together, share Communion, and reunite with our family of faith, but how do we do it safely?

How would Paul guide us to be faithful to God and to our relationships with one another today?

These stressful times can lead to disagreements about how to proceed, different ideas about masks, anger over conflicting perspectives on the vaccine and — most important — misunderstanding about our mutual purpose as a Christian community.

In Ephesians, the early church is called to speak truth in love (4:15), to put away all bitterness, wrath, anger, wrangling and slander, together with all malice. And to be kind to one another, tenderhearted, forgiving one another, as Christ has forgiven us (4:31-32).

How do we speak the truth in love: truth about how we are feeling, truth about what we want, truth about where we believe God is leading us as a community of faith?

Speaking the truth -- sharing thoughts and ideas openly and honestly -- requires courage, vulnerability and safety, Speaking the truth in our church communities as we seek to build up the body of Christ requires the creation of sanctuaries where people can speak without fear.

In the book Crucial Conversations: Tools for Talking When Stakes Are High, the authors write that when you build safety you can dialogue about almost anything. This isn't something that just happens; "safety has to be made."

In a crucial conversation opinions vary, stakes are high, and emotions run strong. How do we talk openly? How do we work through high stakes and controversial issues honestly and respectfully and still remain together as a community of faith? (continued) According to the authors of Crucial Conversations, successful conversations encourage the free flow of information and "start with heart": working on ourselves first and recognizing what we really want our motives), and developing our personal dialogue skills.

People who are gifted in dialogue, based on their research, keep a constant vigil for safety because nothing kills conversation like fear. For them, the first condition for safety is mutual purpose, which means that others perceive that we are working toward a common outcome, that we care about their goals, interests and values, and vice versa. Finding mutual purpose means that we really must care about the interests of others – not just our own.

At the same time, the authors of Crucial Conversations are clear that "while it's true that there's no reason to enter a crucial conversation if you don't have Mutual Purpose, it's equally true that you can't stay in conversation if you don't maintain Mutual Respect."

To be able to speak our truth and for others to speak theirs, there must be Mutual Purpose and Mutual Respect -- truth spoken in love. In the letter to the Ephesians (5:1-2a) that means we are called to "be imitators of God, as beloved children, and live in love as Christ loved us."

As we continue to learn how to BE CHURCH in new circumstances, may we build safety for crucial conversations seeking mutual purpose while respecting each other, learning to love as Christ loved us.

Questions for discussion

1. What advice about communication do you think Paul would give the church today?

2. Is your congregation a safe place for a crucial conversation? How was that safety built? Or how could it be built?

3. Do you remember a time when you entered into a crucial conversation that was a positive experience? What conditions made that possible?

4. Could you identify a mutual purpose for an upcoming crucial conversation in your congregation? Where is God in that purpose?

One-third of NIN funds support the <u>Council for American Indian Ministry</u> (CAIM). Two-thirds of this offering is used by the UCC's Justice and Witness Ministries (JWM) to support a variety of justice initiatives, advocacy efforts, and direct service projects through grants. Neighbors in Need grants are awarded to UCC churches and organizations doing justice work in their communities. These grants fund projects whose work ranges from direct service to community organizing and advocacy to address systemic injustice. This year, special consideration will be given to projects focusing on serving our immigrant neighbors and communities.

Most UCC congregations will receive the NIN offering on **August to September**, **202**1 as part of their World Communion Sunday observance. However, some local churches select another date. NIN contributions can be made online at any time <u>here</u>.
